Introduction to the Day

Tetelestai!

Tetelestai is a Greek word that is usually translated in English at "It is finished", one of the seven last words of Jesus spoken from the cross, according to the gospels. It is also a word that pertains especially to our understanding of what happened on Good Friday with Jesus' death on the cross, which meant more than just the end of Jesus' life.

Tetelstai might be better translated as "It is completed!" or it is fulfilled. In common Greek use, it was often the word that was stamped on debt notices indicating that the obligation had been paid in full. Therefore, when Jesus said "Tetelestai!" he was not just saying his life was over, but proclaiming the will of God complete and the promises of God fulfilled.

It is with this understanding of "Tetelestai!" that we enter into our solemn worship on Good Friday. The altar and chancel area have been stripped of adornments, symbolizing the barrenness and humiliation of the cross. We office a service of Tenebrae, the Latin word for darkness. Tenebrae is a devotional and meditative service during which we remember the crucifixion and death of Jesus and provides time for adoration of the Lamb of God and his sacrifice for us. The darkness in the church recalls the darkness which surrounded the cross and covered the earth from noon until 3 o'clock when Jesus died.

SEVEN CANDLES

There are seven candles in the front of the church, symbolizing the seven last sayings or "words" Jesus said from the cross as death approached. Throughout the service the candles are put out and the lights are dimmed representing the extinguishing of the life of Jesus. Near the close of the service, a candle is returned to the altar as we remember the hope of the promised resurrection.

SILENCE

In keeping with the solemnity of the day, there will be no post-service music as we end in silence. The altar area and cross will remain available following the end of the service to allow time for individual meditation and reverence of the cross.

The stillness and darkness surrounding us tonight are intended to contrast with the bright and glorious celebration of Easter morning when we proclaim in the promise of the resurrection – "The Lord is Risen."

READING – Isaiah 52:13 – 53:12

See, my servant shall prosper; he shall be exalted and lifted up, and shall be very high.

All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth.

By a perversion of justice he was taken away.

Who could have imagined his future?

For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people.

They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.

Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with pain.

When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper.

Out of his anguish he shall see light; he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge.

The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities.

Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he poured out himself to death, and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

THE SEVEN WORDS OF CHRIST FROM THE CROSS

The Sayings of Jesus on the cross (sometimes called the Seven Last Words from the Cross) are seven expressions biblically attributed to Jesus during his crucifixion. Traditionally, the brief sayings have been called "words".

A person's final articulated words said prior to death or as death approaches generally are taken to have particular significance. These seven sayings, being "last words", may provide a way to understand what was ultimately important to this man, Jesus, who was dying on the cross.

Since the 16th century, The Seven Last Words from the Cross have become an integral part of Good Friday liturgy in various Christian traditions.

Each of the Words includes a reading, reflection and hymn, during which a candle is extinguished.

HYMN

Christ, the Life of All the Living (339)

1 Christ, the life of all the living, Christ, the death of death, our foe, Christ, yourself for me once giving to the darkest depths of woe: through your suff'ring, death, and merit life eternal I inherit. Thousand, thousand thanks are due, dearest Jesus, unto you.

2 You have suffered great affliction and have borne it patiently, even death by crucifixion, fully to atone for me; for you chose to be tormented that my doom should be prevented. Thousand, thousand thanks are due, dearest Jesus, unto you.

3 Then, for all that bought my pardon, for the sorrows deep and sore, for the anguish in the garden, I will thank you evermore; thank you for the groaning, sighing, for the bleeding and the dying, for that last triumphant cry, praise you evermore on high.

THE FIRST WORD - Luke 23:32-34

Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left.


Then Jesus said,

THE SECOND WORD - Luke 23: 35 - 43

And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong."

Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

Jesus replied,

"Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

THE THIRD WORD – John 19: 23 - 27

When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one for each soldier. They also took his tunic; now the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from the top. So they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see who will get it." This was to fulfill what the scripture says, "They divided my clothes among themselves, and for my clothing they cast lots." And that is what the soldiers did.

Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother,

"Woman, here is your son."

Then he said to the disciple,

"Here is your mother."

And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

"Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?"

that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him."

THE SEVENTH WORD – Luke 23:44 - 48

It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God and said, "Certainly this man was innocent." And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts.

READING – John 19: 31 – 42

Since it was the day of Preparation, the Jewish leaders did not want the bodies left on the cross during the sabbath, especially because that sabbath was a day of great solemnity. So, they asked Pilate to have the legs of the crucified men broken and the bodies removed. Then the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first and of the other who had been crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. Instead, one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once blood and water came out. (He who saw this has testified so that you also may believe. His testimony is true, and he knows that he tells the truth.) These things occurred so that the scripture might be fulfilled, "None of his bones shall be broken." And again another passage of scripture says, "They will look on the one whom they have pierced."

After these things, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, though a secret one because of his fear of the Jewish leaders, asked Pilate to let him take away the body of Jesus. Pilate gave him permission; so, he came and removed his body. Nicodemus, who had at first come to Jesus by night, also came, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, weighing about a hundred pounds. They took the body of Jesus and wrapped it with the spices in linen cloths, according to the burial custom of the Jews.

Now there was a garden in the place where he was crucified, and in the garden, there was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. And so, because it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.

"The Stations of the Cross" returns to Emmanuel

Self-guided devotions and online devotions set for Good Friday.



As we enter Holy Week and approach Good Friday, the most solemn day on our church calendar, Emmanuel will once again offer "Stations of the

Cross" devotions in two formats." One will be in-person at Emmanuel, involving a self-guided journey on the road to the cross. The second will be an "on the hour" online devotion. For many people of faith, the "Stations" serve as a deeply moving reflection on the Passion of Jesus during his final hours among us.

The Stations have an ancient history in the church, going back to nearly 1000 years ago as a pilgrimage to Jerusalem to walk in the steps of Jesus on the "Via Dolorosa" or the "Way of Sorrows". Over the passing years, The Stations have been adapted for use around the world in several formats so that followers can revisit Christ's Passion without having to visit Jerusalem to do so.

Today, most traditional observances have 14 stations - images arranged in numbered order along a path and the faithful travel from image to image, in order, stopping at each station to pray and reflect on the moments to remember the suffering of Jesus and the acts of love that took place. Most of the stations come directly from Holy Scripture, though several have arisen out of church tradition over the centuries. Since the 18th century, the church has most often used the following stations:

- 1. Jesus is condemned to death
- 2. Jesus takes up his Cross
- 3. Jesus falls for the first time
- 4. Jesus meets his Mother
- 5. Simon of Cyrene helps Jesus carry the Cross
- 6. Veronica wipes the face of Jesus
- 7. Jesus falls for the second time
- 8. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem
- 9. Jesus falls for the third time
- 10. Jesus is stripped of his garments
- 11. Jesus is nailed to the Cross
- 12. Jesus dies on the Cross
- 13. Jesus is taken down from the Cross
- 14. Jesus is laid in the tomb

For many, a trip through each of these stations evokes deep emotions, running the range from outrage and anger, to gratitude and humility – gaining a greater appreciation for the sacrifice that Jesus made for us, and the injustice in the world that allowed it to happen.

This year, Emmanuel will offer an "self-guided" Stations of the Cross with stations placed in various areas of the church building, all along a path that leads to the cross. These journeys that can be taken anytime throughout the day (Friday, March 29) from 7AM to 5PM. There is no set timeframe for you to complete the "Stations" but one hour is a reasonable expectation.

The online Stations of the Cross will be featured at the top of each hour of the day, starting at 6AM. There will be a short online devotion followed by a period of reflection, lasting 15 minutes in total.

I know that Stations of the Cross might represent something new for you, but I invite you to come and connect with Christ's Passion in this very special way. Many who travelled the Stations last year found it to be a moving and challenging experience.

Emmanuel E-Meal Update

553,000 Meals "Handed Up" And Counting

Thanks Be To GOD!

There are so many connections we have made over four years that have served to support the E-Meal Ministry. However, one stands out above all the others for the sheer amount of food we access, the consistency of support, the amount of healthy food options and the innovative way they are changing the regions approach to dealing with food insecurity. That would be the Garden of Health Food Bank.

The photos above show just a few of the items we were able to gather this week from a trip to the Garden of Health warehouse. For this week's family boxes, we will distribute brussels sprouts, lettuce, tomatoes, peppers, bananas, eggplants, fresh basil and more.

You might remember that the Garden of Health, just like the E-Meal ministry, began to grow during the Covid-19 pandemic, when other food programs were shut down. There innovative approach was to source local food and share local food with neighbors in need before it left the region to go to larger food distribution networks. 
